Dear Athenians,

Therefore, there is no inherent point by which we must turn the Ship of Theseus around and lose the progress we have made. Shall we not keep the Ship of Theseus sailing on toward a great destination? Or is it time to abandon the ship?

I, for one, do not accept abandonment, for I would rather worry about what the Ship of Theseus is than have no ship at all. We are not the majority; we have a great deal of work to convince the polis to allow democracy to decide the fate of the Sip of Theseus. As it stands, a tyrant under a unity executive theory only wishes to build a ship for himself in his likeness.

We, social democrats, are the rallying point, the center of the left, a standpoint to bring together rebels against the new tyrant. We must accept as allies Maoists, Tankies, Centrists, and so on, manpower will be needed to keep the Ship of Theseus afloat. The position is as follows: convince the left, the whole left, of true but powerful incrementalism toward keeping the Ship of Theseus

afloat and sailing better than ever before.
